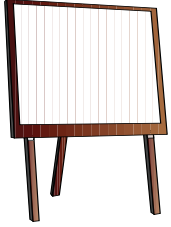

***Prehistoric Mounds of the Ozarks:** *Two 42 high x 52 wide panels; must be picked up.* Illustrates mound excavations at Huntsville, AR.

***Discovery Box:** *Produced for Arkansas Archeology Week 1997.*

Hands-on prehistoric/modern tool comparative learning kit.

***History and Prehistory in Arkansas:** *22 x 52 foot glass case, 1994; must be picked up.* Artifact display of Arkansas past.

***Preserving the Past:** *Tabletop display in four panels; study guide available.*

Introduction to archeology with an emphasis on related conservation needs and methods.

***Lost in Time:** *VHS, 60 min., 1984; study guide available.*

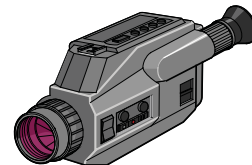
Focuses on the southeast's Native American cultural history from the crossing of the Bering Strait land bridge up to the Mississippian Period.

***First Frontier:** *VHS, 60 min., 1986; study guide available.*

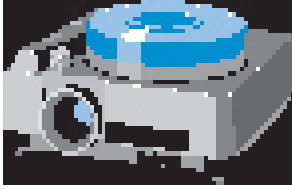
Sequel to *Lost in Time*, 300 years of southeastern US history including Spanish explorers and the Trail of Tears.

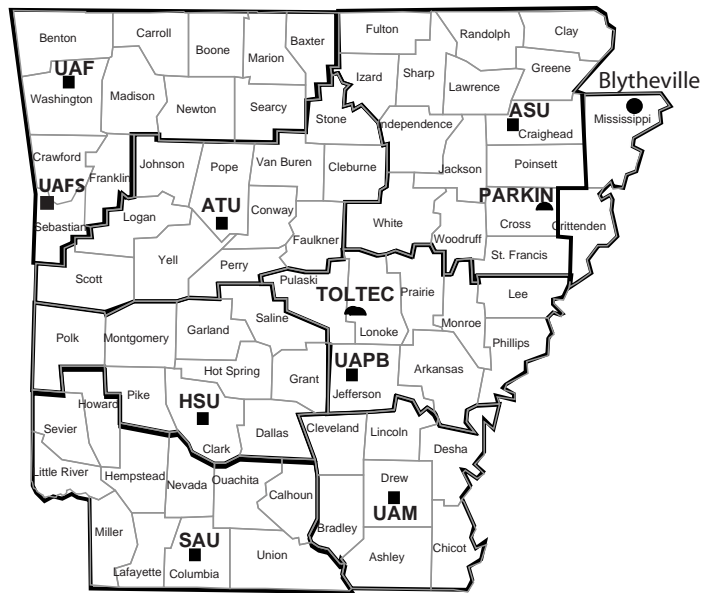
